Treasure Valley iCan Bike Camp 2015

<u>June 15th-19th</u>, the <u>iCan Shine bike program</u> will be back in Idaho at the Homecourt YMCA in Meridian, Idaho to teach individuals with disabilities <u>ages 8 & older</u> how to ride a conventional bike and become a lifelong independent rider.

Rider Registration opens in March! Registration will be open through May 15th, on a first come first serve basis. Only a limited number of slots are available. Cost is \$150.00 for the week long camp for TVDSA members, and \$200.00 for non-members.

iCan Bike uses a fleet of adapted bicycles, a specialized instructional program and a trained staff to teach individuals with disabilities how to ride a bike. Riders attend the same 75-minute session each day for five consecutive days (M–F) whereby they are physically assisted and encouraged by two volunteer "spotters."

Over the course of the 5-day camp the adapted bike is adjusted to gradually introduce more instability in an effort to challenge riders at their own individual pace. Success in learning to ride a bicycle is a major accomplishment. Learning to ride builds confidence and an improved self-image. At the 2014 Treasure Valley iCan Bike Camp 82% of the riders became independent riders of a traditional 2-wheeled bike. We hope to have the same results this year!

Certificate Program v. Regular Diploma - No Way! by Susan Bruce

What graduation track is your child on? If she wants to attend a community college or college, she will need a regular high school diploma! Parents of children with disabilities need to understand the different types of diplomas offered by your school. Will your child receive a regular or standard diploma? Has the IEP team considered the course standards for a regular diploma and determined your child cannot meet them? Why not? Is an "alternate diploma" appropriate for your child?

"My child is getting ready for 9th grade. She has an IEP. The school suggested we put her in the certificate program. Is this a good idea?" This is a subject parents need to consider carefully. It has been my experience that the "alternate diploma" is not worth the paper it is written on. Even community colleges require at least a GED. Most employers require a high school diploma, GED, or ask that a perspective employee work toward one of those. Don't settle for an "alternate diploma." Begin with the highest expectation possible for your child. Don't lower that expectation until you extinguish every possibility.

What can a parent do? First, consider what the IDEA says about high expectations in the purposes section. "Almost 30 years of research and experience has demonstrated that the education of children with disabilities can be made more effective by having high expectations for such children and ensuring their access to the general education curriculum in the regular education classroom, to the maximum extent possible..." 20 U.S.C.1400 (c) (5)

This should be done in order for a child to- "meet developmental goals and, to the maximum extent possible, the challenging expectations that have been established for all children; and be prepared to lead productive and independent lives, to the maximum extent possible."

Second, consider the following questions.

- Why does the IEP team feel your child cannot meet course standards in order to receive a regular high school diploma?
- What supports and accommodations were discussed that would help your child receive a regular high school diploma?
- What does your child need in order to meet the same expectations as other students?
- Could your child complete the requirements for the regular diploma by the time he is 21? A student with a disability can receive services until the age of 21 or until he graduates with a regular high school diploma, whichever comes first
- Would the "alternate diploma" allow your child, to the maximum extent possible, to lead a productive and independent life?
- Is the alternate diploma appropriate for your child's level of functioning?

Third, consider using the transition plan to address the diploma. An IEP should include transition services no later than the first IEP in effect when the student turns 16. Transition services are services that step your child up to moving to the adult world. Transition services should:

- Be designed with a results oriented process.
- Focus on improving the academic and functional achievement of your child to "move" your child from school to post school activities.

Post school activities could include any of the following.

- Postsecondary education (college)
- Vocational education
- Integrated employment
- Continuing adult education (GED, perhaps)
- Adult services
- Independent living
- Community participation

Continued Need for help to keep TVDSA going!

Although the Treasure Valley Down Syndrome Association (TVDSA) has had a good year in 2014 with a lot of productive and successful activities, without your help, 2015 does not look so positive. Although the board can assist, they are not the only workhorses behind each project. Current openings include:

- <u>Programs Chair</u> oversees the different social group activities, filling in when there is a vacancy, assist in the Easter Egg Hunt and Christmas party preparations.
- Fundraising Chair oversees all fundraising events outside of the Buddy Walk, endless opportunities.
- <u>Community Chair</u> oversees the family meetings, sets up involvement in parades and local conferences, and helps oversee the World Down Syndrome Day Celebration and the Summer Picnic.
- <u>Buddy Walk Chair</u> (ideally two chairs that will co-chair) organize and oversee the Buddy Walk committee for the annual Buddy Walk held in October.

Not interested in being a board member? How about <u>helping out on a sub-committee</u>? Without help in the committees, board members cannot stay sane and projects cannot succeed:

- <u>Buddy Walk Committee</u> numerous individuals are needed to make the Buddy Walk successful each year areas include: pre-registration, t-shirts, raffle, sponsorships, administrative licenses, food sourcing, event day volunteers, entertainment, plus onsite organization.
- <u>Family Meetings Coordinator</u> someone to help organize discussion topics and speakers, child care and location for the family meetings held the second Tuesday in January, May, September, and possibly November.
- <u>Cool Club Coordinator</u> someone to organize outings in the community for individuals with Down syndrome ages 12-17 (Junior and Senior High school students). Although activities can be monthly, the goal is 6-8 activities through the year plus coordinating a Christmas Celebration with the Adults in Motion in December.
- <u>ATV Raffle Committee</u> 5+ individuals needed to help organize a new TVDSA fundraiser. An ATV has been donated, and TVDSA will be raffling it off. We need people to organize and sell tickets. ATV will be awarded at the Summer Picnic 2015.
- <u>Calendar Committee</u> **3-5 individuals** are needed for the annual calendar. The calendar takes creativity, time, photography knowledge or willingness to find one at a low price, and organization of the models.

We appreciate you taking the time to consider helping the TVDSA family so we can continue to be a successful non-profit organization, ran completely by volunteers and no paid staff. Your help is priceless and greatly appreciated by all.

Diploma (continued from Page 2)

The transition plan should base transition services on your child's individual needs. The IEP team should consider your child's preferences, interests, and strengths. What does he want to do? If your child wants to attend a community college or college, he will need that regular high school diploma! Transition services should include the following.

- Instruction (address deficit areas)
- Related services
- Community experiences
- Development of employment and other post school living objectives
- Acquisition of daily living skills, if appropriate

Transition services in the IEP must include:

- Appropriate measurable postsecondary goals based upon age appropriate transition assessments, related to training, education, employment, and, where appropriate, independent living skills; and
- The transition services (including courses of study) needed to assist the child in reaching those goals.

Transition services can be special education, if your child needs the services provided as specially designed instruction or a related service in order to benefit from special education! When thinking about transition planning, ask yourself these questions.

- How does your child's transition plan address moving her from the school world to the real world?
- What are your child's preferences?
- What are your child's strengths?
- What does your child want to do after graduation?
- What does your child need in order to help her meet those goals?
- Does your child need remediation in a particular area in order to meet these goals?
- What assessments tools did the school use?
- Are the transition goals in the IEP measurable?
- Where is the data?

IEP teams can develop and use transition plans to help students with disabilities meet the high expectations set for all students. As with every other special education issue, make yourself an expert.
