Treasure Valley iCan Bike Camp 2015

<u>June 15th-19th</u>, the <u>iCan Shine bike program</u> will be back in Idaho at the Homecourt YMCA in Meridian, Idaho to teach individuals with disabilities <u>ages 8 & older</u> how to ride a conventional bike and become a lifelong independent rider.

<u>Rider Registration now open!</u> Registration will be open through May 15th, on a first come first serve basis. Only a limited number of slots are available. Cost is \$150.00 for the week long camp for TVDSA members, and \$200.00 for non-members. Registration forms can be found online at: http://icanshine.org/-boise-id/

iCan Bike uses a fleet of adapted bicycles, a specialized instructional program and a trained staff to teach individuals with disabilities how to ride a bike. Riders attend the same 75-minute session each day for five consecutive days (M–F) whereby they are physically assisted and encouraged by two volunteer "spotters."

Over the course of the 5-day camp the adapted bike is adjusted to gradually introduce more instability in an effort to challenge riders at their own individual pace. Success in learning to ride a bicycle is a major accomplishment. Learning to ride builds confidence and an improved self-image. At the 2014 Treasure Valley iCan Bike Camp 82% of the riders became independent riders of a traditional 2-wheeled bike. We hope to have the same results this year!

10 Ways to Improve Literacy with Your Older Child with Special Needs in the Community by Becca Eisenburg

Many older children, adolescents and adults with developmental disabilities have varying literacy skills. Some individuals are literate, and others struggle with literacy, even into adulthood. From my perspective, you are never too old to learn how to read. I want to discuss ten easy ways to improve literacy when out in the community during regular daily tasks. No pen and paper needed and all free!

1. Street signs

Point out street or community signs within your community. Some of these signs can be when on the road or in a public place (e.g. library, post office, hospital, etc.). Review words such as "stop", "police", "restroom", "men", "women", "exit", etc. When out in the community, point out these words to your child so that they can begin recognizing the words over time.

2. Take out menus

Pick up some take out menus from your favorite restaurants around your community. Review vocabulary and discuss the varying foods on the menu. If your child can read the words on the menu, he or she can be more independent in making a choice when dining at a restaurant.

3. At the Post Office

The post office can be an optimal place for a literacy activity. The next time you are at the post office, point out key words to your child such as "priority mail", "express mail", etc. You can even take a couple of labels home to practice reading and filling out (e.g., certified mail receipts).

4. At the Grocery Store

Point out key words in the grocery store. Each aisle sign has different words such as "cookies", "crackers", "cereal", etc. Take some photos of the names of the aisles so you can practice at home.

Autism in Down syndrome is not typical autism

An increasing number of children with Down syndrome are being diagnosed as also having autism or autistic spectrum disorder (ASD). Research is exploring the prevalence and the characteristics of autism and autistic spectrum disorders in people with Down syndrome, and informing more reliable diagnosis. More research is needed to better understand these dual diagnoses and to identify effective ways to support development and learning for these children.

What educational research has shown

An increasing number of children with Down syndrome are being diagnosed as also having autism or autistic spectrum disorder (ASD). Autism is a complex disorder and children with the diagnosis do not all have the same symptoms or difficulties.[1,2] Those with autism are at the more severely affected end of the ASD spectrum.

There have been a number of recent studies reporting varying rates of autism among children with Down syndrome possibly because of different diagnostic measures and different numbers of children in the studies. These suggest that about 16-19% of children with Down syndrome also have ASD and some 8-9% have autism, although some indicate higher rates.[3]

Diagnosis of ASD is based on symptoms in three domains: social impairments, communication impairments and repetitive behaviors and should only be carried out by experienced clinicians using standardized assessments. The diagnosis is more difficult to make in children with intellectual disability and there is a significant risk of false positives - in other words, a diagnosis of autism that is not correct.[4,5]

While there is now no doubt that children with Down syndrome can also have ASD, it is not clear that the pattern of symptoms that they show are the same as other children with ASD. A recent UK study with the largest sample of children with Down syndrome and ASD evaluated to date (183 participants) illustrates this.[5] Children with both Down syndrome and ASD showed less impairment on the Communication Domain in imitation, use of gestures and imitative social play than individuals with ASD but not Down syndrome. On the Reciprocal Social Interaction Domain, children with Down syndrome and ASD showed less impairment in eye gaze, social smiling, shared enjoyment, offering comfort, social overtures and response to other children's social approaches. However, on the Restricted, Repetitive and Stereotyped Patterns of behavior there was only one difference. The children with Down syndrome and ASD showed a greater tendency to exhibit compulsions or rituals than the other children with ASD. Otherwise they showed the same behaviors as others with autism.

Children with Down syndrome may also show behaviors associated with ASD even though they do not have ASD. For example, another UK study reported that compulsive behaviors, insistence on sameness and restricted preferences were as common in children with Down syndrome without ASD as in those with ASD.[6] These behavioral traits could lead to incorrect diagnoses of ASD for some children with Down syndrome.

When children with Down syndrome and ASD are compared with children with Down syndrome who do not have an ASD, the children with Down syndrome and ASD are likely to be more severely cognitively delayed and to exhibit more behavior difficulties.[3,4]

How this is helping

A better understanding of the prevalence and characteristics of ASD and autism among children with Down syndrome is helping families and professionals recognize and diagnose the condition more accurately, and to recognize the differences between autism in children with Down syndrome and among otherwise typically developing children.

Research suggests that repetitive behaviors, liking sameness and restricted preferences are common behavior traits in all children with Down syndrome - with and without ASD - and therefore, on their own, not indicative of autism.

Research suggests that parents and practitioners should make full use of the children's social strengths and strengths in imitation and gesture to develop their social interaction and communication skills in the early years.

Unanswered questions

Future research is needed to:

- identify the most reliable assessments for diagnosing autism among children with Down syndrome
- further explore the atypical profile of symptoms in children with Down syndrome and ASD to inform more effective developmental and educational interventions
- better understand the progress of children with Down syndrome and autism over time

Literacy in the Community (continued from page 2)

5. At the Pharmacy

Point out key words in the pharmacy. A pharmacy can be a scary place for a person who has limited literacy skills. We depend on our literacy skills significantly when reading labels of medications. I think many parents fear that their child might take a medicine they weren't supposed to because they misread the medicine label.

6. Public Transportation

Point out key words when on public transportation. For example words like "downtown", "uptown", "open", "closed", "limited", "express", etc. Being able to read these words can make the difference when travel training an individual.

7. Circulars

Take a circular! Circulars can be an excellent therapy tool because it contains pictures and words. Beyond literacy, they can also be used to work on money management.

8. At the Mall

When you are shopping at the mall, point out the names of the stores and your child's favorite restaurants in the food court. Learning these words can be useful not only to increase independence, but it can also improve safety skills in case your child gets lost.

9. Receipts

Keep your receipts! The next time you get a receipt, review it with your child. Have them read the names of items bought, the store you bought it from and any policies such as a return policy, etc.? This can also be an ideal activity for money management.

10. At the Movies

Movie words! When at the movies, have your child read the movies from the monitor at the ticket counter. This can be an excellent exercise that is motivating and functional!
